During his visit, George will speak about the traditions and teachings of Indigenous communities, the legacy of residential schools, the Indian Act, the Sixties Scoop, and other parts of history that were never taught in schools. He also shares how these histories continue to affect First Nations people today, and what healing and change can look like—both inside and outside our communities.

As a retired police officer, George offers a rare and honest perspective on how policing has impacted Indigenous people, and how we can move forward with greater understanding, respect, and compassion.

We invite you to join us for this important conversation—one rooted in truth, but also in hope. George's message is not just about the past, but about the future—about the strength, resilience, and beauty that continues to live in First Nations communities today.
